

## **Bike Winnipeg Board Member Candidate Bios**

### **Kailey Kroeker** (Current board member, running for her second two year term)

Kailey Kroeker, B.Env.D. M.Arch., joined Bike Winnipeg's board in 2016. She has been serving on the Membership/Fundraising committee and in 2017 became Chair of the committee. Kailey is an architectural intern at 1x1 architecture and is passionate about using design to create urban environments that make everyone's lives better. ### **Elizabeth Shearer** (Current board member, running for her second two year term)

Liz works full time at Green Action Centre as the Commuter Challenge coordinator and is determined to get even more people biking more often (and busing, walking, carpooling) especially during the annual [week-long event](#)! Since graduating with a degree in Environmental Studies from the University of Winnipeg in 2014 she has lead several major projects in both the environmental and arts sectors working with Green Action Centre, the David Suzuki Foundation and Manitobans for the Arts. As the Workplace Commuter Rep at the WFF, Shevaun has coordinated their involvement in events like the Jack Frost Challenge, Bike Week, Commuter Challenge, etc. Recently she has been working with the Green Action Centre and the WFF's marketing department to promote GoManitoba as a resource for patrons to go to the festival and reduce the number of vehicles coming to the site.
